15 CREATIVE DISCUSSION WARM-UPS

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FOR EDUCATORS

In this packet, you'll find fifteen separate printable activities you can use with any work of literature. I love using them to help students warm up for discussion (though you could use them any old time). You may choose to let students work on these activities alone, in pairs, or in small groups. Each is designed to take 10-15 minutes, and to give students a chance to review the text so they are warmed up and ready to go for whatever kind of discussion you have in mind.

I have used discussion sparks like these for many years, and generally find it much easier to kick off a student-centered discussion after a short and engaging warm-up. This way the class has a chance to center their thoughts on the text and make the transition from their previous class and passing period before trying to engage in a serious discussion.

Whether or not to grade these activities is your choice. If you find some of your students are not completing the work or not engaging with their partners or groups, you can always let them know you plan to collect the worksheets. A check mark for completion may be enough – the knowledge that you will even be collecting the worksheets may be enough. Or you can go ahead and grade it as an in-class activity, in whatever way you choose.



Great Literature?


What made last night's reading great literature? Or wasn't it? Discuss your thoughts with a partner, then respond below. We will start our discussion today with this question.


The Question Pass

The Comic Book Version


